JOHN JUNKER CHOSEN FIESTA BOWL DIRECTOR

(Excerpted from Arizona Republic article of 1/17/90 by Kent Somers)

The Sunkist Fiesta Bowl turned to a familiar face, selecting John Junker its executive director to replace Bruce Skinner, who resigned this month. The bowl's board of directors met Tuesday night and chose Junker, a former assistant executive director of the Fiesta Bowl.

"I feel fortunate and blessed to be the guy," said Junker, who becomes the bowl's fourth executive director in its 20 year history. Junker, 34, (and a Gerard grad from the class of '73) was assistant executive director from 1980 to July 1989, when he resigned to become the executive director of the John Hancock Bowl in El Paso.

Junker said John Hancock Bowl officials were gracious, allowing him to pursue the Fiesta Bowl position after spending six months on the job. "I'm very grateful to the people down there, and they understand this is my home and my family, a place I spent 10 years helping to build something," he said.

One of his main objectives will be to enhance the Fiesta Bowl's image as a volunteer organization, Junker said. "The big thing is many people don't

realize we're a volunteer organization," he said. "The people who hired me are volunteers," Junker said salary details had not been finalized.

Junker developed the Fiesta Bowl's marketing department, which generated \$3 million in 1988, mostly from corporations that sponsored various events. The Fiesta Bowl has 1,034 sponsors. In his first four years with the Fiesta Bowl, Junker's duties included directing media relations. The bowl then decided it needed a marketing director, and Junker was chosen. He helped negotiate Sunkist's sponsorship.

A native of Ohio, Junker graduated from Gerard High School and received a bachelor's degree in broadcasting from Arizona State in 1977.

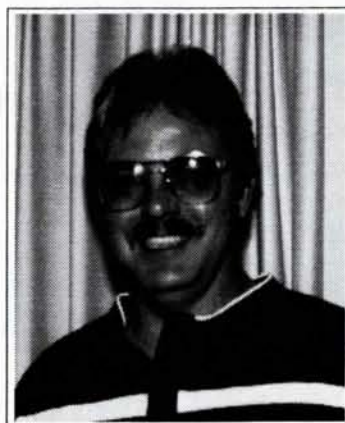

SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE AFFECTS GERARD GRADS

The quake that hit San Francisco during the World Series last Fall was indeed sensational news, but reading about it and living through it are two different matters entirely. Since approximately 30 grads live in the San Francisco area, we wrote them and inquired about their welfare. Of the 30 only six responded, and only two letters, to Bill Ganz ('66) and Phil Gore ('77), were returned by the post office.

Sr. Mary Kevin Gaul, a former Gerard teacher, lives in Burlingame and admits to being well "shook up," but thanks God that their high school had no structural damage, but lots of cosmetic damage.

Mary Briehl Smith, class of '79, and her husband also survived without receiving any structural damage to their home; however, plants, books, pictures, and kitchen cupboards were knocked to the floor. Mary reports that she was at work at 5:04 on October 17th when the quake hit. She grabbed the women next to her and they instantly decided to head to the door frame. The building was constructed to move with the waves so it felt like they were on a lake in a row boat. After the building stopped shaking, they ran outside where they found the ground still moving. It didn't take them long to decide to call it a day.

Living in the hard-hit Marina district, **Sally Brennan-Rath** ('78) and her husband, Bill, held their breath until their building was given the green light by building inspectors. They came through with minimal damage. Sally was working at Macy's on Union Square when the whole building shook violently. With her in the store at the time was an out-of-town visitor. As they were leaving the building the power went out. Not realizing the extent of the quake's damage, they just wanted to get home. "Home" turned into a nightmare as the fire burned just a few blocks from their building.

Marianne McKinley, class of '72, and her son were on a school playground during the earthquake. They were knocked off their feet, but were unharmed. Their home was also fine, but the cupboards were open and the food was on the floor, but nothing major was broken. Marianne is moving north of San Francisco and getting married late spring or early summer.

Ruth Szilagyi ('68) was on her way to teach a class in Palo Alto, about 35 miles from where she lives. When the quake hit, she thought she had a flat tire because her car started fishtailing. However, as she pulled over, she realized that other cars were pulling over and that the traffic lights were swaying. Not realizing the full magnitude of the quake, she didn't discover until she got to school that classes had been cancelled because there was no power. On her return trip to get home she reports that the strangest part of the drive was coming up to the City and seeing only headlights of cars. Despite everything, Ruth still loves SF and wouldn't live anywhere else.

Our final reporting grad was **Bill Redican**, class of '66. Apparently, Bill shares a sensitivity, along with highly evolved organisms such as goldfish, to unwelcome tectonic migrations. He reports that he didn't sleep well for three nights before the quake, and on the day of the quake felt more and more agitated as the day went on. At exactly two minutes to five (he looked at his watch), he couldn't concentrate on his work anymore. He felt like he had drunk ten cups of coffee. By 5:00 he was shaking all over. He told the rest of the office that he had to go for a walk in their (Berkeley) neighborhood to calm down. Six minutes later the quake hit. The warehouse wall across the street was waving around like a sheet, standing on the sidewalk turned into a surfing lesson, and a truck was bouncing around without a driver.

After 15 seconds it stopped, and people poured into the street. Bill drove to the Berkeley Marina and watched the sun set behind San Francisco as an apocalyptic spiral of smoke rose over their Marina. Sirens screamed everywhere. Collecting his thoughts he pondered such ethereal matters as "How did Jerry Michaels ever survive after swallowing that huge glob of mercury in Mr. Aldous's physics class?" and "Did Sr. Marian Clare ever get over her thing about patent leather shoes?"

Without exception, all the grads considered themselves very lucky and grateful to God to still be alive. We do too.
